1 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Welcome,
2 everyone. We are here for our Clean Water
3 Management Trust Fund board of trustees
4 meeting, and I would like to welcome all of
5 our trustees and our guests today.

6 First, I would like to introduce --
7 we have three wonderful trustees. We have
8 Ann Browning, and we have Amy Grissom, and we
9 have Dale Threatt-Taylor, and I appreciate
10 y'all being a part of this group.

11 These ladies went through our
12 trustee orientation, and we all got to have
13 dinner together with staff, so thank you for
14 taking the time. I know you have lots of
15 demands on your schedule, but to put that
16 extra time on your schedule for us to get to
17 know you and you to know us.

18 I also want to thank John Wilson who
19 agreed to join as vice chair, and I
20 appreciate you taking that on. I also thank
21 Jason Walser and Renee Kumor for taking on
22 the chairing of our two committees, the
23 Acquisitions Committee and the Restoration,
24 Innovative Stormwater, and Planning
25 Committee. So thank y'all for that.

1 One other quick thing, we will all
2 make Sydney's day if we returned our hard
3 drives, so we might have some additional
4 information from Sydney that she may need
5 from us. But that will make her life simpler
6 and better, so we'll want to do that.

7 So one thing that I do think, and
8 for new trustees, that there's been some
9 history of us not spending time socially
10 together or going on visits onto the land.
11 We have gotten some legal recommendations
12 that we couldn't do that a number of years
13 ago.

14 Luckily, with our counsel we have,
15 he gave us clearance that it is perfectly
16 fine for us to have that time together, which
17 I really relish, and we get to know each
18 other as people with these extremely hard
19 decisions with all these beautiful projects
20 put before us, and I appreciate your time put
21 before us.

22 Since we are a newly constituted
23 board, we will have a swearing in ceremony.
24 We are very honored to have Judge Bob Orr.
25 We are honored to have you with us. Thank

1 you very much, and we'll be doing the
2 swearing in ceremony.

3 MR. CLARK: How would you like to do
4 this?

5 MR. ORR: We were talking about
6 whether we can do it with one Bible or
7 electronic Bible. The statute says you're
8 supposed to take the oath "on the Bible" or
9 affirm, and we can do it collectively if they
10 need a copy of the oath to read.

11 But I have to say thank you for
12 inviting me to the dinner last night. That
13 is always one of the treats, is to be able to
14 spend a little time with the trustees and the
15 staff.

16 And for those of you who have never
17 served on a board with Dale, I have spent a
18 number of years on the conservation trust
19 board with Dale, and that's an adventure in
20 and of itself.

21 MS. TAYLOR: Love you, Bob.

22 (All trustees sworn in.)

23 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Getting back to
24 our agenda -- and thank you, again, for being
25 here in the swearing in. It means a great

1 deal to all of us.

2 We will go through the roll call and
3 are very happy that all of our board members
4 are here. I'm here as Chair.

5 Ann?

6 MS. BROWNING: Here.

7 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Amy.

8 MS. GRISSOM: Here.

9 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Judith?

10 MS. KENNEDY: Here.

11 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Renee?

12 MS. KUMOR: Here.

13 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Jason?

14 MR. WILSON: Here.

15 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: And Dale?

16 MS. TAYLOR: Here.

17 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Wonderful.

18 Thank y'all.

19 We'll begin with compliance with
20 General Statute 138A-15, which mandates that
21 the Chair inquire as to whether any trustee
22 knows of any conflict of interest or the
23 appearance of a conflict of interest with
24 respect to matters on the agenda.

25 If a trustee knows of a conflict of

1 interest or the appearance of a conflict of
2 interest, please state so at this time.

3 We do have a few on the agenda.

4 MS. BROWNING: I have two on the
5 acquisition agenda, and I'm an acting board
6 member on the Blue Ridge Conservancy. So I
7 want to recuse myself of project 006 and 005,
8 and then on the restoration I will recuse
9 myself of 412 as a partnership.

10 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: I have a
11 conflict on the acquisition of 2019-038.

12 MS. GRISSOM: I have one also on the
13 acquisition. I'm looking for it right now.
14 Apologies.

15 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Is it Three
16 Rivers Land Fund, which is 2019-062?

17 MS. GRISSOM: Yes.

18 MR. WILSON: I would like to recuse
19 from restoration project, 428, the Wilson
20 Creek Watershed Dams.

21 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Thank you, Renee
22 for the planning recusal of 2019-810.

23 Always, please put your cell phones
24 on vibrate or turn it off.

25 I'll now ask if there are any

1 revisions or additions to the agenda. If
2 not, then I would like someone to move for
3 adoption.

4 MR. WALSER: Move to approve the
5 agenda.

6 MS. KUMOR: Second.

7 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: All in favor?

8 (Trustees all in favor.)

9 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Any opposed?

10 (No trustees opposed.)

11 CHAIRMAN CAWOOD: Great. We have a
12 couple of consent agenda issues, and if
13 everybody is fine, we'll take all three of
14 these together unless there is an objection.

15 MS. KUMOR: Move that we adopt the
16 consent agenda.

17 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Is there a
18 second?

19 MS. KENNEDY: Second.

20 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: All in favor.

21 (Trustees all in favor.)

22 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Any opposed?

23 (No trustees opposed.)

24 CHAIRMAN CAWOOD: Great. And now we
25 are very honored to have Chief Deputy

1 Secretary Reid Wilson with us here today, and
2 we'd love to ask him to give us an update.

3 MR. WILSON: Good afternoon,
4 everybody. Great to see y'all. I bring
5 greetings from Governor Roy Cooper, who is a
6 longtime supporter of this organization, and
7 also from my secretary, Susie Hamilton. They
8 are both glad you are in our building today.

9 I want to particularly welcome the
10 three new members, Dale Threatt-Taylor, Amy
11 Grissom, and Ann Browning. Congratulations.
12 I know you're going to do great things for
13 the waters of North Carolina in the coming
14 years.

15 I have two pieces of advice for you.
16 One is to ask questions. There are no dumb
17 questions here. You may think it is, but
18 it's not. Probably other people are having
19 the same thought. This is a somewhat
20 complicated organization with far too many
21 acronyms, so speak up.

22 And the second is get to know your
23 fellow board members and staff. This is an
24 amazing group of people who do a fabulous job
25 and are committed to the mission, and you're

1 going to enjoy working with them.

2 I know over the last day and a half
3 the committees have done the bulk of the
4 work, but the things you're going to do this
5 afternoon are substantial and important to
6 the people in North Carolina. Substantial
7 because you're going to be allocating and
8 approving at least \$13 million. It could be
9 more.

10 But there is a flip side to that,
11 and people were talking about this in the
12 elevator ride up here, and there is going to
13 be more and more projects that you're not
14 going to be able to fund.

15 I think in my past life I may have
16 been at one of these meetings where my
17 organization's project was one point away
18 from getting funded, so it is important that
19 y'all are looking at these projects very
20 carefully and closely and making sound
21 decisions because there can be a project that
22 is a 75 and gets money and the 74 doesn't,
23 and that's tough but that's just the way it
24 is.

25 Of course, there will be another

1 budget session where we will try to get more
2 money.

3 I do want to digress on the budget
4 question for a second. I think you're all
5 aware that the House overrode Governor
6 Cooper's veto of their budget. That's not
7 the end to the story.

8 The Senate still has to do the same
9 thing. There is some question when that vote
10 might be taken, how it might go. So we still
11 don't know whether you're going to have
12 13 million or 20 million, plus whatever
13 license plate revenue comes in during the
14 course of the year.

15 But regardless of what that final
16 number is, there were some other things that
17 happened at the legislature this year that
18 were quite positive. For one, this board was
19 reconstituted as being constitutional, and
20 that was a doubt for a while, especially for
21 those of you who are already on the board and
22 are aware of that.

23 But the bill that was passed also,
24 sort of, changed the name of this
25 organization to the North Carolina Land and

1 Water Fund. It suggested some tweaks to the
2 criteria for funding, and I think to the
3 great relief of all employees but one, it
4 transferred their status from a political
5 position subject to the, you know, the
6 governor's wishes to actually being permanent
7 safe-protected state employees.

8 So Walter and I will remain subject
9 to the whims of the government. Everybody
10 else is in good shape, which is a really
11 wonderful thing.

12 Other things that happened at the
13 legislature, several bills were passed that
14 created a new state park and three new state
15 trails all out west. State park is going to
16 be called Pesquevue State Park, 1500 acres
17 roughly near Asheville, and then there's
18 three new state trails, Northern Peace,
19 Wilderness Gateway, and Overmountain Victory
20 State Trail.

21 I mention those because that's good
22 news, and there will be more places for
23 people to get out and enjoy nature, and I'm
24 going to go out on a limb here and boldly
25 predict that there will be people in this

1 room who will apply for funding for those
2 projects in the coming years. So just a
3 warning there are groups in the room who may
4 be coming with really strong applications in
5 the coming years to make those authorized
6 entities a reality.

7 So back to what you're doing today,
8 it's important for everybody in this State,
9 the projects you will approve are going to
10 either protect good water quality or help
11 clean up degraded water quality. So this is
12 about making sure that water is safe for
13 swimming, fishing, drinking.

14 It's also about providing more
15 public access so that families can get out on
16 the land and natural areas and get away from
17 their crazy lives and get healthy both
18 mentally and physically. It is about
19 protecting wildlife habitat and natural
20 heritage areas.

21 And it's also about preserving
22 treasured cultural and historical places. So
23 you have a lot going on, and y'all know that,
24 but it is important to remember that your
25 decisions will improve public health, help

1 the economy, and improve the quality of life
2 for people all across the state.

3 So I want to thank several groups of
4 people for doing what you do. One is the
5 staff. You guys are amazing, and you just
6 always impress, and this organization works
7 so well because of what you do, so thank you.

8 Second, I want to thank all the
9 interested parties in the room who work so
10 hard to bring these projects forward. I know
11 it can be a long arduous task to figure out
12 which landowner you want to talk to and go
13 spend quality time with that family for -- I
14 don't know -- years, and then finally bring
15 an application forward, get it approved,
16 eventually complete the real estate
17 transaction, and then it is done. But I know
18 that takes a lot of time and effort and
19 persistence and guile.

20 And, last, I want to thank the board
21 again for your public service. What you do
22 is so important. We are talking about clean
23 water, and nobody lives without clean water.
24 So the decisions you make are going to help
25 everybody's lives in this state every single

1 day. So thank you for what you do and good
2 luck and have a great meeting.

3 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Thank you, Reid.

4 Next, we'll have a legal update from
5 Hank Fordham.

6 MR. FORDHAM: I don't have anything
7 unless anybody has questions.

8 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: That's a very
9 good thing, not to have a legal update.

10 MR. WALSER: Since our last meeting,
11 we've had lots of dialogue about conservation
12 restrictions, and we don't have a proposal
13 today, but the conversations are on the way.

14 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Walter, our
15 executive director report.

16 MR. CLARK: I don't have a lot to
17 add to what Reid already said. That's the
18 nice thing going second to him, he covers the
19 bases.

20 I will iterate very strongly how
21 appreciative I am personally of this
22 wonderful staff. I can't imagine doing the
23 job I do without Terry, Will, Nancy, Marie,
24 Marissa, Sydney, Damon, and Justin, and I'm
25 probably leaving somebody out.

1 As you know in the last two days of
2 seeing these spreadsheets, the amazing
3 summaries that Damon and Justin have put
4 together how thorough they are, how
5 conscientiously they worked on all of our
6 project applicants to get the right
7 information, and how they bring a lot of
8 their understanding of the nuances of each of
9 those projects to the table for your
10 consideration. Because we often say if it
11 was all just about the scoring system, we
12 wouldn't need a board of trustees. So those
13 nuances are important, and that's why your
14 job is so important.

15 Of course, I'll reiterate Reid's
16 point about our new trustees, Dale and Amy.
17 I mean, I can't imagine a more professional,
18 talented board with the kind of depth and
19 experience that all of you have.

20 Most of you have come out of the
21 land protection world. You understand the
22 issues that we're talking about, and you're
23 joining an already awesome team of people,
24 and I'm so happy that you're here.

25 Reid mentioned basically Senate Bill

1 381, which was the vehicle, the piece of
2 legislation this year that made some changes
3 to Clean Water or now the Land and Water
4 Fund. Fortunately, that wasn't an immediate
5 mandate, so we get to evolve into that name
6 slowly.

7 One of the things you will see over
8 the next few months is a rebranding effort
9 around that name, and we want the trustees to
10 participate in that as much as possible.

11 Reid mentioned that initially years and years
12 ago when the Clean Water Trust Fund was named
13 we were more about clean water.

14 And now we're talk natural heritage.
15 We're about historical sites and military
16 buffers. There are so many factors that we
17 do and consider as a board and staff now that
18 the name change was timely and important.

19 But it gives us a real chance to get
20 the message out to the Raleigh audience about
21 what we do and who we are, and it's not often
22 that we get that chance. I'm excited, and I
23 hope y'all join in that excitement over the
24 next few months to work how we rebrand Clean
25 Water.

1 Lastly, I'll say there was some
2 other changes. Reid mentioned one of them
3 that was immediately important to me when I
4 started this position, and that was being
5 sure our staff was protected by the Safe
6 Personnel Act.

7 I think by not being so, every time
8 there was an election the whole staff was
9 worried about what could happen, and now
10 there are protections there for everybody,
11 except for me and Reid. It was important to
12 me, and I know it was important to the staff.
13 That's about all I have. It's an exciting
14 time for Clean Water or the Land and Water
15 Fund.

16 As always, the most disappointing
17 and the most disappointed thing about this
18 meeting is all the projects we can't fund,
19 and I think we see both committees not
20 struggle with that.

21 But look at these projects over the
22 last few days, and, gosh, I wish we could
23 fund them all when you're talking about
24 making the difference between funding a
25 project that scores a 74 or a 72. I know it

1 is tough.

2 I know, as Reid said, it is tough
3 for the applicants to, but I think they also
4 appreciate the staff, and the good work y'all
5 do in helping them understand why we score
6 the projects the way we do, and you make the
7 decisions that you do as the board of
8 trustees. So thank you very much.

9 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Thank you,
10 Walter. Any questions for Walter? Great.
11 We'll move on now.

12 This is the part where we invite
13 members of the public to come up and address
14 the board. We ask that you limit your
15 comments to 3 minutes if you could, so I'm
16 sure y'all have great things to say. We do
17 want to get through the agenda.

18 If anyone would like to come up and
19 address the Board, we welcome you.

20 Perfect. Y'all are welcome to
21 e-mail us, and let us know through staff if
22 there is anything you would like to bring to
23 our attention. We'll move on to the business
24 section portion of our agenda, which is
25 consideration of the Acquisitions Committee

1 recommendations, and I'll turn it over to our
2 chair, Jason.

3 MR. WALSER: I would like to ask
4 that the staff do some technical revisions to
5 the minutes that kind of swept under my nose
6 in the consent agenda. Nothing substantive,
7 but there were a couple of typos that I saw,
8 and I would ask the staff to correct those
9 typos, so just a point of order.

10 Yesterday we looked at 36 projects
11 which I think covered somewhere in the area
12 \$20 million. The first order of business --
13 and the Allocations Committee would like to
14 make a recommendation of the full board -- is
15 that we continue to fund 2 percent of our
16 budget for donated minivan projects.

17 And I guess I'll make that
18 recommendation on behalf of the committee
19 right now, and that comes as a formal motion,
20 2 percent of whatever our funding is.

21 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Since it is from
22 the committee, it doesn't need a second. So
23 we can vote on it. All in favor?

24 (Trustees all in favor.)

25 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Any opposed?

1 (No trustees opposed.)

2 CHAIRMAN CAWOOD: Great.

3 MR. WALSER: So we are struggling
4 with what our budget is, and I think we had a
5 really good and healthy discussion yesterday
6 for 5 hours. There was a lot of good team
7 work, and I'm grateful for that, but the
8 overall recommendation is that we have
9 \$9,933,382 to award.

10 In addition to that, \$106,443 would
11 be available for military projects, and we're
12 going to delve into that in a second. So
13 we're looking at a little more than
14 \$11 million.

15 You've already heard the recusals
16 from Greer, Amy, John, and Judy. So we've
17 already had several recusals. And below, I'm
18 going to read out the recommendations if
19 that's okay with you, Chair.

20 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Yes.

21 MR. WALSER: We are proposing to
22 fund Project No. 2019-063, Town of Cedar
23 Point, Masonic Tract, Boathouse Creek at
24 \$576,290. Project No. 2019-006, Conserving
25 Carolina, Abes Creek, Horse Pasture River

1 Aquatic Natural Area at \$546,854. Project
2 No. 2019-006, Blue Ridge Conservative, Three
3 Top East at \$1,135,730.

4 Project No. 2019-024, Maggie Valley
5 Sanitary District, Johnson Branch Tracts,
6 \$1,185,000. Project No. 2019-007, Catawba
7 Lands Conservancy, Old Stumpy Preserve,
8 Carolina Thread Trail, \$1,042,255. Project
9 No. 2019-054, Three Rivers Land Trust,
10 Bennett Tract, Poison Fork, \$545,000.

11 Project No. 2019-027, Mainspring
12 Conservation Trust, King Meadows Tract,
13 Hooper Bald at \$725,142. Project No.
14 2019-018, Foothills Conservancy of North
15 Carolina, Caldwell Timber, LLC, Canoe Creek,
16 \$1,200,000. Project No. 2019-051, The Nature
17 Conservancy, Squires Tract 2, Black R, at
18 \$105,925.

19 Project No. 2019-001, Alamance
20 County Recreation and Parks, Sizemore Tract,
21 Cane Creek Mountain Natural Area, 1,200,000.
22 Project No. 2019-005, Blue Ridge Conservancy,
23 Sparta Wetland Expansion, \$133,260.

24 Project No. 2019-012, Conserving
25 Carolina, Cane Creek Greenway Extension at

1 \$126,850.

2 Project No. 2019-039, Southern
3 Appalachian Highlands Conservatory, Canton
4 Motorsports Tract at \$1,200,000. Project No.
5 2019-017, Foothills Conservancy of NC, Bobs
6 Creek Wilderness Ph3 at \$210,576.

7 And that rounds out our recommended
8 funding from funds that we know we have
9 available as of now. And there's a lot
10 discussion if you want to have it, and that
11 comes as recommendation from the committee,
12 so we can vote on it.

13 MR. FORDHAM: The acquisition, the
14 first vote you can exclude -- just exclude
15 the ones with the conflict.

16 MR. WALSER: Let's enter discussion
17 now, and then we'll decide if we want to vote
18 on this recommendation.

19 I know not everyone was privy to the
20 meeting yesterday, so these will be funded,
21 and the next list will be those that would be
22 provisionally funded. But these will be
23 funded as of what we think we have to work
24 with today.

25 MR. WILSON: Do you want to

1 summarize, Jason, sort of the peculiarities?

2 MR. WALSER: I'm going to welcome
3 staff input on this.

4 There are two major issues. One
5 is military funding. We have funded, as
6 part of our recommendation, I want to say
7 \$1.7 million in military projects that we're
8 recommending.

9 We had a very hardy discussion about
10 whether or not the military projects would be
11 valued-added projects. In other words,
12 whether we would fund military projects that
13 would make the cut.

14 Most of these made the cut in terms
15 of the score, and they would have been funded
16 anyway, and there was not -- there was
17 consensus but not a unanimous decision. So
18 if we wanted to have that conversation again,
19 we could.

20 The second big issue is we had a
21 couple of projects that we bumped up. They
22 did not score this threshold of funding. We
23 bumped them up because they were time
24 sensitive and might fall apart if they are
25 not funded today, and that would be the

1 Southern Appalachian Highlands Conservancy,
2 Canton Motor Sports Track, and I want to say
3 Blue Ridge Conservancy.

4 MR. CLARK: I think we noted that
5 was important. I don't think we bumped it
6 up. It was just Canton Motor Speedway.

7 MR. WILSON: And the bumping was
8 minimal because they were all in the 76-point
9 score category, and it was just moving those
10 that were time sensitive a place or two
11 higher, and with the consent of the entity
12 that was being moved down to get funding
13 hopefully very soon.

14 MR. WALSER: Thank you, John. That
15 is very important. We did get consensus for
16 those who would be next on the list would be
17 able to wait a little bit, and I think that
18 was important in our decision-making.

19 MS. GUTHERIE: John, if could
20 clarify, the list you read is from the
21 9.9 million that is available. You have a
22 list coming up with the million dollars
23 directed to the military.

24 So in the first group that was read,
25 there is only one project in there that has

1 the military component; and then the other
2 project with the military component are in
3 another group you will hear in just a minute,
4 or they are on a larger provisional list and
5 may be funded with additional revenue this
6 year.

7 MR. WILSON: The tract that culled
8 out is in the military list for Town of Cedar
9 Point is for \$576,290?

10 MS. GUTHERIE: Yes.

11 MR. WILSON: That was partial
12 funding for that roughly \$1 million with
13 the other part coming from the military
14 \$1 million?

15 MS. GUTHERIE: Yes.

16 MR. WALSER: So would it be helpful
17 to go ahead and run through the military
18 projects and go through the vote?

19 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: My conflicts are
20 not within either of these two groups, so I
21 can vote.

22 MR. WALSER: Fantastic. Awesome.
23 So the proposed military funding projects
24 this year are: Project No. 2019-030, North
25 Carolina of Coastal Management, Primland

1 Tract, Alligator R, \$159,870. Project No.
2 2019-028, North Carolina Coastal Land Trust,
3 Val Gra Harbor, LLC Tract, Chowan at
4 \$350,258. Project No. 2019-040, Tar River
5 Land Conservancy, Grace Ministries Tract,
6 Camp Butner at \$114,840.

7 And Project No. 2019-063, Town of
8 Cedar Point, Masonic Tract, Boathouse Creek,
9 which is phase 2, at \$435,466.

10 MS. GUTHERIE: For clarification
11 there, the Town of Cedar Point is on both of
12 those lists, as Trustee Wilson explained,
13 that are being funded from what's available
14 today and the military.

15 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Any other
16 discussion? All in favor?

17 MR. FORDHAM: You need to exclude
18 006 and 005. Those are talking about those
19 that are not through the military funding,
20 and then exclude the two that need to be
21 excluded from that.

22 MS. WALSER: The recommendation of
23 Acquisitions Committee is the first list. I
24 think everybody has this list. This is not
25 military projects, although there is one

1 there that is a military project, and I would
2 suggest that this recommendation be
3 considered for a vote with two of the same
4 board members.

5 MR. FORDHAM: Excluding 006 and 005,
6 one recused member, which is Ann.

7 MR. WALSER: I'll trust you however
8 you want to call the vote.

9 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: So Ann has
10 recused herself.

11 So for all other members of the
12 board of trustees, all in favor for approving
13 the projects which have been outlined by
14 Jason? So we are doing all but the projects
15 006 and 005, which we have a recusal.

16 So for all the others on the list,
17 all in favor say.

18 (All trustees are in favor.)

19 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Any opposed?

20 (No trustees opposed.)

21 CHAIRMAN CAWOOD: Okay. Then we
22 will move, and Ann is recusing herself from
23 the two other projects, 006 and 005. We will
24 call for a vote on those two projects. All
25 in favor?

1 (All trustees are all in favor.)

2 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Any opposed?

3 (No trustees opposed.)

4 CHAIRMAN CAWOOD: No. Okay. We'll
5 move on to the military.

6 MR. WALSER: Military projects, I
7 don't think we have any conflicts on these,
8 so we'll make the recommendation.

9 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: All in favor in
10 funding the listed military projects that
11 Jason has outlined?

12 (All trustees said "Aye.")

13 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Any opposed?

14 (No trustees opposed.)

15 CHAIRMAN CAWOOD: Great. We'll move
16 forward to the provisional list.

17 MR. WALSER: Super. So the
18 committee recommends that the following
19 projects be placed on a provisional list, and
20 the way we worded this was they would receive
21 money as much becomes available, whether that
22 be from license plate revenues or from
23 general appropriations or from relinquished
24 projects that are not closed by July 1st of
25 next year that we have in the contract.

1 So these are the provisional
2 proposed projects: Project No. 2019-027,
3 Mainspring Conservation Trust, King Meadows
4 Tract, Hooper Bald, \$725,142. Project No.
5 2019-018, Foothills Conservancy of NC,
6 Caldwell Timber, LLC Tract, Canoe Creek,
7 \$1,200,000. Project No. 2019-051, The Nature
8 Conservancy, Squires Tract 2, Black R,
9 \$105,925.

10 Project No. 2019-001, Alamance
11 County Recreation and Parks, Sizemore Tract,
12 Crane Mountain Natural Area, \$1,200,000 --

13 Am I -- that's embarrassing. Sorry.
14 Sydney, thank you. Let's start over. I
15 apologize. Those were all funded. These are
16 provisionally funded.

17 Let's start over. These are
18 provisionally funded: Project 2019-017,
19 Foothills Conservancy of North Carolina, Bobs
20 Creek Wilderness Ph3, \$989,424. Project No.
21 2019-052, The Nature Conservancy, Thompson
22 Tract, Merrick Creek, \$119,980. Project No.
23 2019-021, Foothills Conservancy of NC, Jonas
24 Ridge Wetland, \$95,625.

25 Project No. 2019-014, Conserving

1 Carolina, Green River Gameland Addition,
2 Green River at \$276,944. Project No.
3 2019-025, Mainspring Conservation Trust,
4 Bartram Tract, Little Tennessee R at
5 \$372,969. Project No. 2019-15, Conserving
6 Carolina, Joel Ridge, Weed Patch Mountain
7 Natural Area, \$234,641.

8 Project No. 2019-049, The Nature
9 Conservancy, Great Dismal Swamp Tract, North
10 River at \$943,546. Project No. 2019-048,
11 Nature Conservancy, Bull Hill, Roanoke River
12 at \$515,291. Project No. 2019-50, The Nature
13 Conservancy, Riverstone-Jenrette Tract,
14 Waccamaw River, \$302,678.

15 Project No. 2019-045, The
16 Conservation Fund, Long Arm Mountain,
17 Linville Gorge at \$1,200,000.

18 Again, please accept my apologies
19 that I confused earlier. Those will be
20 proposed for funding as money comes into the
21 Cleanwater Trust Fund.

22 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Perfect. Any
23 discussion? All in favor?

24 MR. WILSON: So I just realized that
25 the two military projects that we didn't yet

1 fund are a 74 and a 73. I'm not going to
2 propose that they move higher than any of
3 those that we are about to put on this
4 provisional list.

5 But since the lowest score that we
6 have on the provisional list is a 72, I would
7 like to propose we put next on the
8 provisional list and add to the provisional
9 list those two military projects that scored
10 a 74 and a 73.

11 MS. GUTHERIE: I believe they are
12 already on there, line 23 and 24.

13 MR. WILSON: I didn't hear you read
14 them. Sorry. Thank you.

15 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Ready for a
16 vote. All in favor?

17 (All trustees are in favor.)

18 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Any opposed?

19 (No trustees opposed.)

20 CHAIRMAN CAWOOD: No. I need to
21 recuse myself from the next one.

22 MR. WALSER: So this is just a point
23 of order. We funded this. We recommend
24 funding this: Piedmont Land Conservancy,
25 Lassiter Trust Tract, Elkin Creek,

1 Project No. 2019-038, in the amount of
2 \$253,644.

3 Greer has recused herself, and I'll
4 let John call for the vote. That was
5 recommended for funding yesterday, and it was
6 left out in our list of projects.

7 MS. GUTHERIE: That is recommended
8 for the provisional list, and it would be
9 placed on the provisional list just above
10 2019-045, The Conservation Fund, Long Arm
11 Mountain.

12 MR. WILSON: So with Greer recusing,
13 all in favor of having the Project 2019-038,
14 Piedmont Land Conservancy, Lassiter Trust
15 Tract, Elkin Creek in the amount of \$253,644
16 added to the provisional list?

17 (All trustees said "Aye.")

18 MR. WALSER: Last but not least, we
19 are preparing to meet in December and
20 hopefully we'll have a budget by then, and
21 we'll know if we'll have more money, and
22 we'll make additional funding recommendations
23 at that time if we're able to. And that's
24 the end of my report.

25 MS. GUTHERIE: The committee did

1 discuss that on the provisional list. Those
2 will be funded in that order, but any funds
3 that are returned or that are available to
4 the committee, that may be license plates,
5 return funds, it may be any additional
6 appropriation or other sources.

7 And then another point that the
8 committee made was that any funds that are
9 returned from a current military project,
10 those funds would go to one of the
11 military -- to the first military project on
12 the provisional list, so a little additional
13 direction that was given to staff that have
14 discussed.

15 MR. WILSON: If military funds are
16 returned after we funded all of our current
17 military projects, they just remain for
18 military projects in the future?

19 MS. GUTHERIE: Correct, yes. This
20 is how in the last 2 years we had just over a
21 a million dollars.

22 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Thank you for
23 that clarification. Do you need the full
24 board to vote on that?

25 MR. WALSER: That wouldn't be a bad

1 idea. A recommendation from the committee is
2 any reverted funds for the military projects
3 would be put into other military projects?

4 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: All in favor?

5 (All trustees are in favor.)

6 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Any opposed?

7 Great.

8 (No trustees opposed.)

9 CHAIRMAN CAWOOD: Well, again, as I
10 mentioned, thank you members of the committee
11 and also for other trustees who were able to
12 be there through the deliberations. It's a
13 lot of hard work and a lot of great, great
14 projects to consider, and for you to give
15 that much of your time, it is greatly
16 appreciated.

17 MR. WOMACK: On the military
18 context, I would like to state that the
19 committee had a very rigorous discussion
20 around the military context, and in my
21 opinion they wrestled with the connotation of
22 the directive of the general assembly.

23 And I feel they are acting in the
24 best interest of that directive, and we came
25 to the proper conclusion, based on our

1 license that we were given, to move forward
2 with that being done. I think we tried very
3 hard to fit that into the discussion, and I
4 feel very really good about that.

5 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Good. Anything
6 else? Move on to Renee's committee.

7 MS. KUMOR: We are Restoration,
8 Innovative Stormwater, and Planning
9 Committee, and those of you who are counting
10 noses will notice that we are renaming
11 ourselves the Women Water Warriors.

12 So we again had a very interesting
13 discussion, and some of you from the
14 acquisition were there to listen and
15 encourage us and ask a few questions that we
16 didn't even think of.

17 So I'm going to read forward --
18 first of all, we had 2 recusals, and we'll
19 handle those in separate motions. Greer
20 recused her in planning, and Ann recused
21 herself in restoration.

22 So we're going to start with our
23 planning recommendations, and the committee
24 is recommending that -- historically we've
25 kind of taken the moneys that are available

1 to us and used 10 percent planning, 10
2 percent innovative stormwater, and 80 percent
3 restoration.

4 This year, our percentages of the
5 money that we used is 13 percent, more or
6 less, for planning, and 15 percent for
7 innovative stormwater, and 72 percent for
8 restoration.

9 So with that in mind, I will make
10 the motion from the committee who has
11 recommended that we fund under planning
12 2019-811, which is Matthew and Florence
13 Recovery and Resiliency for \$25,000;
14 2019-804, Hyde County for \$158,804; Audubon
15 NC, Cuttituck Sound Marsh, \$103,700.

16 2019-806, NRC, Winkler's Creek at
17 \$103,700; and 2019-805, North Carolina DNCR,
18 House Creek Watershed Preserve for \$83,648.
19 That excludes what we will recuse you from.

20 So what I would like everybody --
21 that motion is on the floor.

22 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Perfect. All in
23 favor?

24 (All trustees are in favor.)

25 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Any opposed?

1 (No trustees opposed.)

2 CHAIRMAN CAWOOD: Great.

3 MS. KUMOR: Now, for the item that
4 Greer is recusing herself from that would
5 seek the motion from the committee and that
6 is 2019-810, Rockingham County, Troublesome
7 Creek Watershed Preserve, \$47,000, and we
8 recommend that be also be accepted by the
9 board. John, you have to do that.

10 MR. WILSON: With Greer recusing as
11 chair, all in favor in 2019-810, Rockingham
12 County, say I.

13 (All trustees are in favor.)

14 MS. KUMOR: The next one we're going
15 to talk about is Innovative Stormwater
16 Projects, and again, we are funding the
17 request for about 15 percent of our funding.
18 We had several projects, but the funding that
19 we determined was available based on what we
20 wanted to do with regard to restoration was
21 to fund -- and this comes as a motion from
22 the committee -- 2019-1003, NCCF, East End,
23 Phase 2 at \$259,356, and Project 2019-1001,
24 Asheville, EW Grove Park for \$250,000.

25 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Great. All in

1 favor?

2 (All trustees are in favor.)

3 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Any opposed?

4 (No trustees opposed.)

5 CHAIRMAN CAWOOD: Great.

6 MS. KUMOR: And now the committee
7 recommends 9 restoration projects to be
8 funded for about 72 percent of the funds that
9 are available to us, and those are 2019-402,
10 Charlotte, Long Creek, Phase 2, \$400,000;
11 2019-422, UT Cape Fear River for \$400,000;
12 2019-410, Battleship North Carolina, Eagles
13 Island Shoreline Restoration, \$400,000.

14 2019-0413, South Fork New River,
15 Phase 2, \$275,000; 2019-426, Lower Roanoke
16 Tributary Gut Restoration, \$225,000;
17 2019-428, Wilson Creek Watershed
18 Improvements, \$77,500; 2019-414, Black Creek
19 Watershed Dams, \$400,000.

20 2019-406, Living Shorelines for a
21 portion of their request which was \$194,853.

22 MR. WILSON: I'm recused on
23 2019-428, Wilson Creek Project.

24 MR. FORDHAM: Would it be possible
25 to modify your motion to take out 428?

1 MS. KUMOR: So I'm talking 428 out
2 of my motion.

3 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Great. Any
4 discussion? All in favor?

5 (All trustees are in favor.)

6 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Any opposed?

7 (No trustees opposed.)

8 CHAIRMAN CAWOOD: Great.

9 MS. KUMOR: Now I think I have 428
10 and 412. Ann is recused on 412 and John is
11 428.

12 The committee makes the
13 recommendation to fund with John's recusal
14 2019-428, Wilson Creek Watershed for \$77,500.

15 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Great. All in
16 favor?

17 (All trustees are in favor)

18 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Any opposed?

19 (No trustees opposed.)

20 CHAIRMAN CAWOOD: Great.

21 MS. KUMOR: And the committee makes
22 the following recommendation with Ann's
23 recusal for 2019-412, Middle Form New River
24 for \$40,000.

25 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: All in favor?

1 (All trustees are in favor.)

2 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Any opposed?

3 (No trustees opposed.)

4 CHAIRMAN CAWOOD: Great.

5 MS. KUMOR: If you'll notice, I told
6 you on our motion for all of these projects
7 that we funded a portion of 2019-406 and
8 moved the balance of that request to the top
9 of our provisional list. So you will see
10 this 2019-406 again on a list, but that's for
11 the balance of the project.

12 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: With the cap,
13 total balance of the project.

14 MS. KUMOR: Yes, within our cap.
15 I'm sorry. We were using -- when we got to
16 restoration, we used a cap of \$400,000 to
17 spread our money around.

18 We had both provisional projects in
19 planning, innovative stormwater, and in
20 restoration, and the committee decided to put
21 all of those provisional projects together
22 and rank them without regard to the type that
23 they were but are interested in seeing that
24 something was funded.

25 Our recommendation is that we fund

1 along the lines of what acquisitions
2 recommends as money comes in.

3 So with that understanding, you will
4 see that we've mixed restoration, planning,
5 and innovative stormwater projects based on
6 the interest and of the committee and the
7 importance of the projects to be gotten done.

8 Did that make sense to you? The
9 motion from committee is we have prioritized
10 our provisional projects as: Project
11 2019-406, Living Shorelines, \$205,147;
12 2019-407, CREP 2019, \$400,000; 2019-424,
13 Surry SWCD, UTs to Grassy Creek \$395,000.

14 2019-417, North Buffalo Creek for
15 \$400,000; 2019-408, Swine Buyout Phase 5 for
16 \$400,000; 2019-1002, Durham County SWCD,
17 Riverside High School, \$382,000.

18 2019-411, Kirby Farms, Helton Creek
19 for \$315,500; 2019-807, Loves Creek
20 Watershed, \$138,571. 2019-1004,
21 Characterizing Trends from NPDES Data,
22 \$54,809.

23 2019-1006, Optimizing Floating
24 Wetlands at \$186,286; 2019-416, Grove Park,
25 \$400,000; 2019-403, Wilders Grove, \$400,000,

1 and 2019-1007, Riverlink, Disconnected
2 Impervious Surfaces, \$139,415.

3 And, Madam Chair, that is our
4 motion, and there are no recusals.

5 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Excellent. So
6 from committee, all in favor?

7 (All trustees are in favor.)

8 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Any opposed?

9 (No trustees opposed.)

10 CHAIRMAN CAWOOD: Perfect.

11 So great work by the committees.

12 Thank you both and all members of the
13 committee. Very thoughtful work put in,
14 which is greatly appreciated, and for all of
15 our partners who were funded with their great
16 projects, we congratulate you.

17 For those partners who had great
18 projects that we don't have enough money to
19 be able to fund them, we're in consolation
20 with you.

21 MR. WALSER: Talk to your
22 legislation.

23 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Great, great
24 work done by the trustees, and we can't go
25 without an echo out to the staff of the

1 incredible work you do to arm us with
2 information to make the best possible
3 decisions we can. So we appreciate your
4 dedication.

5 And I would ask if there is any more
6 business to come before --

7 MR. WILSON: Do you want to make an
8 announcement about a field trip?

9 MR. BEVINGTON: I will, but I am
10 unprepared. We have been invited to a field
11 trip of an active restoration project under
12 construction, and I'll forward an invitation
13 with details on the dates sometime later in
14 September.

15 MR. SUMMER: It is September 20th,
16 and I believe it is 10:00 in the morning,
17 which is near the Gill State Forest, but it
18 should be good. There will be active
19 construction on one of the projects we
20 funded.

21 So if you want to see on the ground
22 how the earth has moved and the structures
23 are put into place, I think it is
24 fascinating. I think it will be worthwhile
25 for anyone that wanted to go west or travel

1 back east a little bit and see how these
2 things are put together.

3 MR. BEVINGTON: One last bit, do
4 bring hiking boots or boots that can get wet
5 and safety vests, just stay out of the way
6 from the bulldozer or two.

7 I'm sure we'll stay safe. Engineer
8 will be there. I have an invitation from the
9 engineer who is overseeing the project, and I
10 will forward that all to you.

11 In my e-mail to y'all today, I'll
12 ask for the RSVP. If you change your mind
13 and want to join us last minute, jump on the
14 train.

15 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Anything else
16 from anybody else? I'll entertain a motion
17 to adjourn.

18 MS. KUMOR: Second.

19 CHAIRWOMAN CAWOOD: Perfect. All in
20 favor?

21 (All trustees are in favor.)

22 (Whereupon the hearing was concluded
23 at 3:38 p.m.)



Article V. Depositions and Discovery

Rule 30

(e) Submission to deponent; changes; signing.

The sound-and-visual recording, or the transcript of it, if any, the transcript of the sound recording, or the transcript of a deposition taken by stenographic means, shall be submitted to the deponent for examination and shall be reviewed by the deponent, unless such examination and review are waived by the deponent and by the parties. If there are changes in form or substance, the deponent shall sign a statement reciting such changes and the reasons given by the deponent for making them. The person administering the oath shall indicate in the certificate prescribed by subdivision (f)(1) whether any review was requested and, if so, shall append any changes made by the deponent. The certificate shall then be signed by the deponent, unless the parties by stipulation waive the signing or the deponent is ill or cannot be found or refuses to sign. If the certificate is not signed by the deponent within 30 days of its submission to him, the person before whom the

deposition was taken shall sign the certificate and state on the certificate the fact of the waiver or of the illness or absence of the deponent or the fact of the refusal or failure to sign together with the reason, if any, given therefor; and the deposition may then be used as fully as though the certificate were signed unless on a motion to suppress under Rule 32(d)(4) the court holds that the reasons given for the refusal to sign require rejection of the deposition in whole or in part.
