Agenda Item 1a) 1997B-013 Cabarrus Soil and Water Conservation District, Clarke's Creek Rookery

In 1999, the State accepted a conservation easement on 33.21 acres known as the Clarke Creek Wetlands and Rookery in Cabarrus County as part of a grant awarded to the LandTrust for Central North Carolina, now known as Three Rivers Land Trust. The property was protected for its water quality and bird nesting benefits in a rapidly urbanizing area.

The property is now owned by Cabarrus Soil and Water Conservation District, who uses the property for limited environmental education opportunities. However, because the conservation easement was recorded without any rights reserved for the landowner, their ability to provide public access is blocked. Cabarrus SWCD would like to build boardwalks to increase access and have been approached by Cabarrus County for development of a trail that will increase connections to a future City of Concord park and elementary school.

Over the years, the property's surroundings have become increasing developed, limiting access and increasing the opportunity for encroachment. NCLWF and Three Rivers Land Trust staff agree that additional access on this property will provide important recreational and environmental education opportunities and help decrease third party trespass and other violations through awareness and appreciation of the site's importance.

Committee recommendation


Amend the conservation easement to include standard reserved rights found in NCLWF's current template, including trail and boardwalk construction and maintenance, one boat dock, and maintenance of an existing road.

Agenda Item 1b) 2007-056 Triangle Greenways Council Capital Area Greenway easement amendment

In 2010, the State accepted a donation of a conservation easement on 31.7 acres owned by Triangle Greenways Council as match for a grant awarded for the Capital Area Greenway along Walnut Creek in Wake County.

Prior to the granting of the conservation easement, there was an existing City of Raleigh sewer interceptor line, with plans to replace 1950s and 1990s infrastructure that is over capacity and showing signs of deterioration. The City is ready to begin construction on this replacement sewer line as early as spring 2021. The line will require 0.7 acres of right-of-way paralleling the existing sewer line and 0.59 acres of new right-of-way, for a total permanent impact of 1.3 acres. In addition, the project will impact an additional 0.4 acres of temporary construction easement that will be restored in consultation with Triangle Greenways Council. The permanent impacts cover 4% of the total easement area, making this a major amendment subject to Board approval.

The proposed route achieves the goals set forth by the NCLWF amendment policy, in that it minimizes impact to conservation values on this already-disturbed site by paralleling the existing sewer line corridor, minimizing stream crossings, and providing an important public benefit that if unaddressed, could have environmental and health impacts.

Because the existing and proposed sewer line bisect this property, staff recommends adding a reserved right to the conservation easement to allow for this additional interceptor line, rather than terminate that section and divide the remaining easement.

Committee recommendation

Approve the request to amend the easement to allow for an approximately 1.3-acre sewer right-of-way.

Agenda Item 1c) Enforcement of Conservation Agreements

When the State accepts a conservation agreement by and through NCLWF, we are accepting a perpetual obligation to enforce the rights and restrictions of the conservation agreement. Annual monitoring, landowner communication, and review of plans are all preventative measures for ensuring that the conservation values are protected. However, it is inevitable that violations will occur, and it is critical to respond with timely, proportional, and consistent enforcement to resolve the situation.

In an average year, NCLWF staff are alerted to or discover 10-15 potential easement violations ranging from the more prevalent technical or small violations to the rarer major violation. Procedures for managing these violations were drafted prior to 2007, and include sound principals, but reflect a different organizational structure. Staff will brief the committee on the procedures currently in use and highlight areas for improvement and clarification.

Committee recommendation

Direct staff to draft an updated enforcement policy to be added to the NCLWF Policy Manual.

Agenda Item 2) 2021 Grant Application Update

NC Land and Water Fund Guidance for Trustee Site Visit

NCLWF Trustees have the responsibility to administer the funds entrusted to them in the best interest of the citizens of North Carolina and consistent with the enabling statute. In doing so, a trustee may wish to see a project in person to fully understand its impact. A trustee may visit a site, provided the visit promotes the public purpose and does not conflict with the open meetings law.

Site Visit Policy. At the meeting on March 4th, 2019, the Board approved the following requirements:

- 1. The trustee should notify the Executive Director when contacted by an applicant about a site visit, or when he/she desires to visit a site.
- Trustees will allow staff to coordinate site visits to ensure that staff is available to attend and that other trustees are given the opportunity to participate. Coordination will involve staff determination of the applicability of the Open Meetings Law.
- 3. Trustees will make other trustees aware that they have visited a site during the Application Review Meeting and why they felt the visit necessary in promoting the public purpose.

Arranging the visit. When a trustee is interested in visiting a site that is the subject of a current or future application, he/she should notify staff and staff will coordinate with the applicant, other trustees, and interested parties to find a suitable date.

As a general practice, staff will let other trustees know about the site visit and will try to accommodate any who are interested in attending. In the unlikely event that a quorum of trustees for any relevant committee needs to visit a site at the same time, the visit must be noticed as a public meeting and shall be open to members of the public. A minimum of 7 days' notice is required for staff to facilitate the public meeting. Please note that some sites will not be appropriate for a public meeting due to landowner and/or ecological sensitivity.

Deciding to go. It is recommended that trustee site visits should only be undertaken when the trustee feels it promotes a public purpose. If an applicant directly invites a trustee to visit a site, the trustee should independently evaluate the benefit of the visit. If he/she feels that it does indeed promote a public purpose and would like to arrange to visit the site, he/she should notify the Executive Director and allow staff to coordinate the visit as described herein.

Timing. Staff will work to accommodate timing needs. If possible, trustee visits will occur after the initial field visit between the field rep and applicant. While mid-July through August are often the best times to arrange visits, other times during the application cycle will be available as well.

Gifts are prohibited. While on a visit, it is important to remember that food, transportation and logo items such as hats can be considered gifts and should not be accepted.
